

## STATIONS OF REMEMBRANCE

For the Stations of Remembrance, we met with other young people and other participants at a street and listened to a short speech about the events of the Lion's Walk before setting off to walk along it. We walked in silence towards the path where the deportees went to work, pausing briefly every 15 minutes to listen to musicians playing in memory of them. After a few minutes, we reached the mine and went inside to see first-hand the conditions, but also the macabre places these victims had to work. It was an experience that we will certainly remember.

The event ended at the memorial cemetery, which is a very moving place. The victims of the concentration camp were buried in a mass grave at this site by the Nazis. A walk through this cemetery is a moving experience. You pass a long row of graves, each representing a broken life, a broken family, a broken dream.

In this cemetery, emotions mix and overlap. There is anger at the injustice, grief at the loss and compassion for the suffering.
